# Decorated trees for Esperanza Center auction carry wishes of hopes, wishes and acceptance

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Stringing popcorn and cranberries together and writing aspirational quotes on little scrolls might not sound like a cutthroat activity.

But 48-year-old T.R. Alderete of Las Cruces got a little competitive Friday as he sat down to make Christmas tree ornaments with other men going through Santa Fe Recovery Center's 30-day rehabilitation program.

Alderete said he wanted the men to outshine the recovery center's women, who were decorating their own tree for the Trees of Hope auction, an annual event that raises funds for the Esperanza Center.

"It was a competition," said Alderete, laughing, as the men's group hung homemade ornaments on their tree at Drury Plaza Hotel, where it will be on display during the auction. "We were busting our butts, we think. You know, girls are going to be more creative and have a lot more patience to do stuff."

The Trees of Hope fundraiser this year will feature more than a dozen artificial Christmas trees, decorated and donated by groups ranging from the Girl Scouts organizations from both Santa Fe and Los Alamos counties to Family Medicine Partners of Santa Fe and Chase Bank. Would-be buyers can check out the trees at the Drury — which donated its space — between Tuesday and Saturday and place bids on their favorites.

All proceeds will support the Esperanza Shelter, a domestic violence shelter that reopened its central location earlier this year after housing people in hotel rooms and apartments throughout the pandemic. Patricia Varga, the shelter's vice president of donor and community relations, said the fundraiser has been put on twice before — in 2020, when it brought in somewhere between \$25,000 and \$30,000, and in 2021.

Jessica Callow, admissions administrator for the Santa Fe Recovery Center, said she brainstormed with the men's 30-day program members to come up with their decorating theme: "The Tree of Hopes and Wishes."

"That's when we came up with the ideas for the scrolls on there, the inspirational quotes and something for the family [who buys the tree] just to have and enjoy a new year," she said.

The men decided to go homemade with their ornaments, using the internet to come up with expressions to write on their scrolls.

Michael "Mikey" Armijo, a 42-year-old Albuquerque resident who is in the program to get help with alcohol addiction, said he included a famous quote from Henry Ford that he finds personally inspirational: "Whether you think you can or you think you can't, you're right."

"In our addiction, that's pretty much what it is," Armijo said, adding that he hopes whoever takes the tree home finds "pure joy and happiness and inspiration and laughter" from the scrawled scrolls.

Yes, laughter — because the men's group decided a little levity was in order, and included a number of scrolls with "kids' jokes."

"What's a bear without any teeth?" said Alderete by way of example. "A gummy bear. Little stuff like that they can open, they can read it, and it'll put a smile."

Nytasha Martinez, a 33-year-old originally from Acoma, held her 2-month-old daughter, Raylene Louis, in a front pack Friday while she helped hang ornaments on the "Faith, Love and Acceptance Tree" — the Santa Fe Recovery Center women's contribution.

It was a particularly meaningful theme for Martinez, who has struggled with both alcohol and drug addiction, which she describes as her family's "generational curse." She was admitted to the program when Raylene was just 2 weeks old. Martinez, who hopes to regain custody of her older two daughters and become a substance abuse counselor after leaving the program, said she hopes the tree spreads the message of acceptance.

"Us addicts and alcoholics, we're still people inside," she said. "We didn't make the best of choices ...
[but] we deserve to be accepted in a world where it's really just kind of full of hate."

Alderete, who has been battling a meth addiction for years and is going through the center's 30-day program for the third time, said the loss of his teenage nephew in a shooting two years ago hit him hard. He's hoping to be accepted into the center's 90-day program after the first-month program wraps up.

He said working on the ornaments with the other men was enjoyable and a nice break from the often painful recovery process of revisiting the past.

"To take time out of recovery and just put our energy ... into something like this to give back, that's such a good liberating feeling," Alderete said.
